The WIIFM question.

On March 13th the Central Leadership Council had a special meeting to discuss Bluebills membership recruitment. Representatives from each chapter provided back-

ground information and data on their area of responsibility.

The goals discussed were:

Establish processes that provide opportunities for Bluebills and Boeing employees to work together.

Develop a program specifically aimed at recruiting new Bluebills and promoting the Bluebills organization.

Future meetings will result in plans to establishing a closer connection with current Boeing employees and joint volunteer efforts.

I asked a question I usually bring up when anybody starts discussing volunteer involvement and commitment. The WIIFM question. If you haven't heard of that before it's: "What's In It For Me?" That's another way of asking: Why are people/members involved? Why are people volunteering? What is the reward for volunteering? What do we have to do to encourage/motivate people to volunteer? I believe these are the important questions we should be asking.

At the March meeting I will be sharing some data on the Heritage Chapter meeting attendance and volunteer participation. Basically it shows that we have an average of 52 people attending at least 10 meetings a year. Since we have 621 members in Washington that means @ 19% of our members like to attend our meetings, however if you look at how many attend, our attendance rate is 8%, resulting in a new question. How do we make our meetings better (and increase attendance)?

We have an average of 88 members reporting volunteer hours, which means @ 14% of our members are reporting their volunteer efforts. Is that all that are volunteering? I hope not! Turn in your volunteer hours so we get better, more complete data.

So now I'm asking all of you: how do we improve our membership? Improve our meetings? Build our leadership team? Improve our chapter?

All your ideas are welcome and needed. Your involvement and commitment is wanted and needed. Please contact me or anybody on our leadership team (or anyone in the Bluebills office) with your views on anything concerning these subjects/ questions.

At the end of this monthly Chairman's Corner I would like to continue to acknowledge someone who has provided us with service in the Bluebill tradition. This month it's Eleanor Skinner. I first met Eleanor in 1982 or 83, Boeing was having layoffs and SPEEA voted to give Christmas presents to their children. With her husband and several others we found out what was on their "wish lists" and provided a little Christmas cheer. She was a long time volunteer with the World Vision Kids In Need program. Now a-days; she volunteers at the Kent Senior Center, Gamma Delta Cancer Research, Bluebills Retiree Assistance Program, Salvation Army Kids Christmas Shopping, and most importantly she is our host at the door of our meetings also coordinating the food bank effort.

March Meeting Recap

Chairman Doug Hoople called the meeting to order with the Pledge of Allegiance. First on the agenda was the introduction of first-time members at our meeting: Emmett Omar and John Mah (who attended the annual picnic along with his wife); and there was one guest, Judy Glubrecht. Next were March birthdays: Karen Baker, Meri England, Doug Hoople, Margaret Stone and Richard Vaughn. Only one March anniversary: Karen and Bill Baker. Jim Bunt was recognized for his participation in the Big Climb, the fundraiser for The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. He was the oldest contestant to climb 1,311 steps, or 69 floors, of the Columbia Tower. Way to go, Jim.

With the help of view foils (remember those?), Doug then presented statistics for Bluebills members' participation with regard to meeting attendance and volunteer hours versus the number of members. He is committed to improving these statistics by encouraging members to get involved.

Doug also stated the organization's budget is under review and already there are signs of reductions in the area of community projects such as providing gift bags to the nursing homes on three holidays during the year. Efforts for continued sponsorship are being made.

Doug then turned the microphone over to Curtis, from the USO, who spoke on behalf of the USO Relay for Life Race for the American Cancer Society benefit. This year our participation will be in honor of Maybelle Brickley, whom we lost to cancer last December. For more information, contact Doug or Lonnie Stevenson.

Jim Beasley then introduced the speaker, John Urquhart. the 33rd Sheriff of King County, WA. As Sheriff, he serves as the chief county-level law enforcement official for 1.9 million people and oversees the 1000+ employees of the K.C. Sheriff's Office.

Urquhart grew up in Seattle and attended Ingraham



High School, graduating in 1967 as Class President. He then attended the University of Washington, graduating with a Bachelor's degree in Business in 1971. He paid for his college education by operating a

painting company he started in high school! Later, he owned an electrical construction materials business, which he sold in 1988.

Urquhart's first job in law enforcement was as a Re-

serve Deputy Sheriff for the Island County Sheriff's Department, serving from 1975-1980. He then joined the K.C. Sheriff's Office as a Reserve Deputy Sheriff in 1980, eventually becoming a full-time Deputy Sheriff in 1988. During his 24-year career with the department, he served in a number of roles including: Field Training Officer, Narcotics Detective, Sergeant, Administrative Aide to the Sheriff, and Spokesman. He retired in February 2012 and became President of the S.H.E.R.I.F.F. Fund.

In late 2012, Urquhart decided to enter the race for King County Sheriff, a non-partisan elected office, and won the position in November 2012, with 56 percent of the vote.

John lives on Mercer Island with Shelley, his wife of 40 years. They have a Chesapeake Bay Retriever named Lulu. They have two daughters, age 29 and 31. One is an ICU nurse in New York City and the other works at an early-learning center in Seattle. John and Shelley like to ski in Idaho and enjoy spending time on the beach in Hawaii.....that is, when John is not remodeling his house, something he's been working on for 25+ years!

With a good deal of humor and a personal slant, Urquhart provided an outstanding overview of his job as KC Sheriff. After a bit of bantering with the audience and sharing some personal background about his family, Urquhart stated his position upon becoming King County Sheriff. He believes it is his job and the job of everyone in the Sheriff's Office to make sure they maintain the trust of the community. Otherwise, they cannot be an effective crime fighting organization if the community doesn't trust them.

The Sheriff's Office has more than 1,000 employees. It services not only the cities and towns of King County, but also the unincorporated areas, including Skyway and White Center, as well as 12 contract cities, including Shoreline, SeaTac, Woodinville and Sammamish. The Sheriff's Office also is responsible for Metro Transit police, deputies at Sea-Tac International Airport, and search and rescue efforts.

From the beginning of his tenure, Urquhart advocated for better leadership and accountability. For instance, it was said that citizen complaints were not being fully investigated, and that use-of-force cases weren't being properly reviewed. He believed that the outside audits did not blame the rank and file, but that the previous leadership was failing, and it was time to change that.

Urquhart said his first day officially leading the Sheriff's Office began 30 minutes after the start of the swearing in ceremony. He met with his chiefs and his captains to make sure they were all



on the same page. He assured his staff he was on board because he liked working with the people in the Sheriff's Office, and he loved being a police officer. His goals were based on leadership, accountability, and transparency -- a leadership that instills accountability throughout the ranks, commanders as well as deputies.

Among the various challenges, he mentioned the importance of how the department responds to officer-involved shootings. He replied to a question from the audience about law officers "shooting to kill" as opposed to "shooting to stop." He emphasized the near impossibility an officer faces having perfect aim when a suspect it charging him at with the intent to harm.

Urquhart addressed the perennial funding crisis. The Sheriff's Office has had to cut more than 150 deputies over the last five years. It is also scheduled to close its cold case unit. That unit is paid for by a federal grant, which has run out. He says he will try to find funding for it locally, admittedly a big challenge. Budgeting is a never-ending concern. But, he says, public safety is job one for government, and he will do all he can to make sure that whatever money they do have, it will be used wisely, and the citizens of King County will be protected.

Another focus of his is to make his police force more culturally aware. One plan being looked into is putting former Peace Corps volunteers on the payroll. Diversification is an ongoing plan. He stated the force is becoming more male and more white every single year, and that is a problem the force should address to better reflect the increasingly diverse community. The department needs and desires all colors, races and genders to better serve the community.

Urquhart then addressed a good number of questions the audience. It was obvious he had sparked a lot of interest in the topic of the business of being King County Sheriff.

Jim then introduced Ed Devange, who gave a brief talk on the workings of the Meals on Wheels program and how Bluebills members can participate. He had brochures for anyone interested in joining the program and information on how to contact him.

Doug wrapped up the meeting with not only the usual door prize drawings, but Janice Hawes picked the winning ticket for the beautiful quilt that was raffled on behalf of the Busy Bs. Congratulations, Meri England!

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

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
