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Chairman's Corner

For the last three months, the Bluebills Volunteer Data for 2012 has appeared on the front page of the Heritage Newsletter. For me, it brings into focus how many of us are volunteering and how many projects are being supported. Each month more

than 500 of our Bluebills support between 500 and 600 different projects. The three agencies receiving the largest number of our Bluebill volunteer hours are the American Red Cross, the USO, and the Puget Sound Blood Center. On the Bluebill's website someone wrote, "Of course, statistics don't tell the personal stories, or give a sense of the rewards of volunteering, or show the good that is done for your communities, neighbors and friends. They can only give a hint about the potential we have, as a group."

This month I'd like to highlight the agency which receives the highest monthly number of our volunteer hours, the American Red Cross (ARC). It serves King and Kitsap Counties and has chapter offices in Seattle and Bremerton. The ARC brings together local volunteers to care for their neighbors, trains people in life saving skills, and offers immediate, short-term disaster assistance for victims of fires, floods, earthquakes and other natural or man-made disasters. Two of those volunteers are Bill and Vicki Lee. Both are trained Disaster Action Team (DAT) members who are ready to respond to local disasters by providing safe shelters, hot meals, and essential relief supplies. They have also been trained to drive emergency response vehicles and mobile feeding units.

Bill and Vicki have also responded to disasters in other parts of the country. In addition to mass care (for food and shelter), there are other volunteer opportunities with the ARC to assist with emergency communications and services for military families, offer patient and staff support at the Bremerton Naval Hospital, and provide language interpretation and translations. We are blessed to have so many ways to help others and enrich our lives in the process

All of this leads me to sharing that Bill and Vicki Lee have purchased a home in Arizona and will be spending our gray, rainy, days and cold winter months as "snowbirds" this year. Also joining the snowbird migration to Arizona are Ron and Micki Brown. You can probably guess where this dialogue is headed; yes, a shameless drum beating to encourage volunteers to fill the large shoes left by the Lees and Micki. Beginning in September, Micki will be unavailable to continue as co-editor of the Heritage Chapter Newsletter. Since Dick Beham already shoulders major responsibility for the newsletter, we can't expect him to "soldier" on alone. It's important we fill this position quickly. Who will be the first to volunteer? As co-editor, Micki's responsibility has been to report on the monthly meetings and provide photos of our monthly speakers. Micki tells me the Chapter has a nice recorder for taping the meetings, and that the recorder has a USB capacity so transcriptions can be done on your computer.

I hope our recent weather has been perfect for your outdoor activities and that I will see all of you at our August 23rd picnic at Riverview Park. Until then, enjoy the rest of our summer.

Dick Beham renewed his request for people to collect tabs from pop top cans (like colas, etc.). They are combined with those collected from the State Square Dance Association who turns them in and are matched by a benefactor and goes toward kidney research and dialysis.

Jim Beasley introduced our speaker, Bev Lee, from the Washington State Issaquah Fish Hatchery, a 501C organization. Bev has



been with the Hatchery for eleven years and four years ago took the position of Tour and Volunteer Coordinator for

FISH, <u>Friends</u> of the <u>Issaquah Salmon</u>
<u>Hatchery</u>. She lives in Issaquah so it's a perfect location and gave her the opportunity to reach out to the community and help people understand the importance of caring for the watershed and understand the role salmon play in our environment.



"Make A Difference"

Bev started off a great slideshow by showing us a bit of historical Issaquah and the Hatchery. The WPA (1936-1937) actually built the Hatchery, part of which is still quite functional today. Of note is the fact there are only two (yes, 2!) state employees who run the facility - the balance of the "staff" are volunteers, numbering between 10,000 and 11,000! One of Bev's main duties lies with training of these volunteers. Another primary function she leads is that of educational programs. Tours are at a premium with school teachers taking advantage of the

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wealth of information which give hands on time and introduce the next generation to environmental issues. There is a class presentation, "Those Amazing Salmon," primarily for elementary school students who are preparing to visit the hatchery. There are also camps and programs. Speakers are available suitable for a variety of audiences, including senior groups, high school science classes and civic clubs.

The slideshow progressed through the formative years of the Hatchery bringing us current with its growth. A new addition aquarium is expected to be ready in time for this year's Issaquah Salmon Days Visitors will see salmon developing from eggs to fingerlings, just as they do in Issaquah Creek.

This slogan, "Keep the salmon coming



home." is very important. Back in 1992, the State of Washington had the Hatchery "on the chopping block" with other hatcheries to trim the budget. Thanks to local supporters in Issaguah, who not only sent a delegation down to Olympia, 100s of petitions were signed, letters were written and phone calls were made. Olympia got the message that this Hatchery should be taken off the list power to the people! The Hatchery realized this could come up again, so businesses, the Chamber of Commerce, and environmentalists determined the Hatchery would become, in addition to raising salmon, an educational facility thereby making it so unique that the State would not even consider it again. That is when the FISH organization which supports the Hatchery, would show the State

how critical talking about the environment, the role salmon play in it, and the important role that Issaguah Salmon Hatchery plays.

The remainder of the slideshow was quite unique in that we were able to see how, when the salmon return, that their eggs are harvested and fertilized, how the eggs grow (Bev and her husband brought vials of the stages the fertile eggs go through), how they are gradually taken from eggs to full-fledged salmon and how they then are released back into Issaquah Creek to begin the cycle all over again. I can only say that a tour will be on my calendar in the very near future, as this bit of a recap can only scratch the surface of a very interesting part of our little corner of the world -- right in the middle of an urban environment -- there's so much more to the Issaquah Salmon Hatchery!

Bev concluded with a question and answer period. Please visit their website (www.issaquahfish.org) for detail information on how to contribute to the funding of the New Aquarium Exhibit's capital campaign to raise \$20,000 for this project. An upgraded aquarium means visitors will be able to watch salmon develop in an environment that reflects the true nature of a healthy watershed habitat.

In closing, Don Hilt introduced visitors and welcomed them to the Bluebills and held the drawing for door prizes.

Micki Brown announced the opening for coeditor of this wonderful newsletter you have in your hands. She and her husband are becoming Arizona "snowbirds" so the position will be available beginning with the September issue -- which would mean covering the annual picnic -- a fun way to start! 
