Vice Chairman Don Hilt called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance. There were several July birthdays – Elfriede Noble, Lois Barnes and Mary Ulibarri, no anniversaries,

guests or new members. Attendance was a bit light – summer vacations perhaps.

Don then addressed a number of upcoming events. First, the annual picnic at Coulon Park on August 26 -- don't forget to bring your favorite appetizer for the competition, and a potluck dish to share. The September 30 meeting will include the arts, crafts and hobbies event – lots of fun and a chance to show your talents. He stated the need for Heritage Chapter candidates (Chairman and both Vice Chairman positions) for 2017. And Norma added candidates are also needed for the Central Leadership Council for the new year. Don encouraged members to submit their choice of Volunteer of the Year, which will be announced at the annual luncheon in October.

Fran Parker is spearheading the collection of school supplies. Members are encouraged to bring items to the picnic and the September and October meetings. Or funds may be donated and volunteers will do the shopping for you.

Heinz Gehlhaar mentioned the annual children's shopping trip at J. C. Penney's on August 24, 7:00 a.m., and passed around sign up sheets for those interested in participating -- a fun and rewarding event.

Jim Beasley then introduced the speaker, Stephen Deal, recent Development Director for El Centro de la Raza. For the past 14 years Stephen worked in resource development helping generate

over \$60M for the community. He started his development career at United Way of King County initially working as a loaned executive. His portfolios encompassed a diverse group of companies and individuals focused mainly in the legal, construction and manufacturing industries.



As Capital Development Director, Stephen com-

pleted his work raising over \$5M to support a new multi-use, transit oriented 112-unit affordable housing development called Plaza Roberto Maestas, and to support the expansion of El Centro de la Raza's Child Development Center. Through this effort, Stephen helped El Centro de la Raza garner the largest gifts in the history of the organization through varied strategies. The facility is located near mass transit and also provides 150 parking spaces. Residents have begun moving into their new homes and the project will be fully complete in August of this year.

Stephen stated his career path has now taken him to a Vice President position with United Way of Pierce County as of a week ago. He continues to strive to abide by the philosophy embodied by the quote found at the bottom of many of his emails: A person starts to live when he lives outside himself. Albert Einstein (1879-1955)

As an organization grounded in the Latino community, our mission is to build unity across all racial and economic sectors, to organize, empower, and defend our most vulnerable and marginalized populations and to bring justice, dignity, equality, and freedom to all the peoples of the world.

Vision

We envision a world free of oppression based on poverty, racism, sexism, sexual orientation, or discrimination of any kind that limits equal access to the resources that ensure a healthy and productive life in peace, love and harmony for all peoples and our future generations.

Principles

El Centro de la Rasa "Familia" adopted twelve guiding Principles in the fall of 1976, four years after its conception. In essence these twelve principles are the "constitution" of the organization and have been a critical guide through its many years.

The 12 Principles of El Centro de la Raza

• To share, disburse, and distribute our ser-

- vices, resources, knowledge and skills to our participants, community, and visitors.
- To strive to eliminate institutionalized racial, sexual, age and economic forms of discrimination.
- To support the majority of people in this country in the struggle for collective bargaining rights, safety, benefits and just wages and salaries.
- To promote the recapture of the culture, language and respect for the Chicano/ Mexicano/Latino community.
- To promote strong and positive working relationships with other minority communities in all areas of work, service, political and social activities.
- To provide a collective, healthy, safe and friendly workplace.
- To struggle against all forms of racism, sexism, individualism, ageism, and violence in our work and our community center.
- To strive to create programs and services which a society must provide for the development of our community and its people.
- To provide for a clean, safe, and nuclear wastefree environment for our people and future generations and to work for a rational use of natural resources.
- To support the rights of self-determination of all peoples and promote the development of foreign policy by our government toward principles of sovereignty, justice, democracy, self- determination, international respect, and above all, peace with dignity.
- To strengthen the family as an elementary formation of society which contributes to the development of society as a whole.
- To strive for a dignified human existence for all people in our society; for health care, housing, and full employment in equal educational opportunity, democratic processes in political and social affairs and an equitable economic system which eliminates the great differences in income which are the cause of poverty and deprivation.

Stephen concluded by answering a number of thoughtful questions from the audience.

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Following the door prize drawings, Don adjourned the meeting.

- Nominee's efforts must be performed as a non-paid volunteer.
- Bluebills reserves the right to use all nominees' names and achievement records in news stories and feature articles at a later date, whether or not the nominee wins.
- Agencies, organizations or projects with which the nominee has volunteered will be contacted to verify nomination information.
