The primary detail that she discussed is the need for clipping the complete UPC codes (also known as *bar codes*) instead of just the "Campbell's" logo on the label. These are given to her daughter who is a special education teacher with 14 profoundly disabled students. She thanks everyone who diligently clips, saves and brings them in monthly – keep up the good work!

BATTELLE NATURALISTIC DRIVING STUDY

This information was passed on by one of our Bluebills and want to let anyone who is interested in participating have this information to check out for themselves.

There is a study going on to gather important information about traffic safety and it will be used to reduce crashes and fatalities in the United States.

They are still trying to recruit drivers for the study, and are especially looking for drivers aged 16-20 and over 75 years old. Some of us Bluebills fit into this category and probably have grandchildren that also qualify. To help with this, they have broadened the list of eligible vehicles. For drivers aged 16-20 they will accept almost any vehicle manufactured after year 1990. Also, if there is a teenager who drives your study vehicle as their primary vehicle, they may be eligible to participate as a primary driver for that same vehicle. They would need to complete the same assessment activities as an over 75 year old and would also receive \$500 in compensation.

If you know of individuals age 16-25 or 76 plus who drive on a regular basis, and who might be interested in participating, please have them call 1-866-215-6617. They can also find out more about the study at www.drivingstudy.org.

The Hunt for a Boeing B-314 Flying Boat Pan American NC18601 - the *Honolulu Clipper*

Bob Bogash will our speaker in January at the Chapter said Baby it'll be yours one day. Monthly Meeting. He is working on a project to raise a Model 314 Pan American plane from the ocean

Bob Bogash, retired after more than 30 years with the Boeing Commercial Airplane Group, spent the last 9 years of his career as the Director of Quality Assurance for the Materiel Division. In this position, Bob was responsible for the on-time production and quality of all the non-Boeing produced hardware and software used on Boeing commercial jetliners. Bob states on his web site:

"As a retired Boeing career employee, I've been deeply involved in acquiring and restoring historic airplanes, including the Prototype 727, 737, and 747 airplanes, a Concorde, and most recently a Lockheed Super Constellation. While some of these airplanes are still under active restoration, I, as usual, began getting a case of itchy feet. In other words, I began thinking of a new airplane to begin chasing. An airplane long floating around in the back of my mind was a B-314 flying boat. I had a number of books on Pan Am's boat flying, and in my professional career, had worked for years with Pan Am, and had visited most of the key Pacific flying boat locations."

On Bob's front burner for the past 3 years has been acquisition of a Lockheed Super G Constellation, earlier in Toronto, now in restoration at Rome, New York, for the Museum. He's also on the hunt for a Lockheed Model 10 Electra, a Douglas DC-4, and, most ambitious of all, a Boeing Model 314 Clipper.

This is a presentation you will not want to miss!
