This drew a great round of applause as a lot of our members are service oriented and have served in many capacities. He then asked one of these veterans, Doug Hoople, to lead The Pledge of Allegiance to the beautiful flag which flies over our country, the home of the free because of the brave.

Visitors and new members were introduced; remember Don Hilt's challenge to invite others to join our group? Well, it has brought in some activity! Ben continued with birthday announcements, which led us to Adrian Lawler announcing he was 93! Jim Ewing is 71 and Lonnie Stevenson announced she was born on the *original* Memorial Day, May 30th, but was not sure of the year ... saying that some days she's younger than others! Amazingly no one had anniversaries to announce.

Micki Brown, co-editor of *The Heritage*, thanked those people who stepped in and picked up her tasks while she was on a two-month vacation.

Jim Beasley then introduced our speaker, Helen K. Sernett, Seattle Children's. Helen has dedicated



her career to helping non-profit organizations attain the funds they need to pursue their missions. She has been with Seattle Children's since 2010 and is proud to have the privilege of speaking on behalf of our community's children. Her work

centers on helping individuals throughout our com-

munity understand and support the mission of Seattle Children's which has 3 main facets: 1) Prevention of illness and injury when possible, 2) The best care when children need it, 3) Cures so that no child has to suffer from disease. She is excited to share with the Bluebills some recent highlights of Seattle Children's work and achievements including news of a recent expansion and the successful out-comes of some recent research conducted at Children's downtown research facility.

To say that Helen was profuse in her thanks to our Bluebill's Chapter, would be putting it mildly. She asked Eileen to come forward and read a beautiful

handmade thank you card from some of the children expressing their gratitude for the care packages received. One important fact brought to our



attention, was Seattle's Children's serves the largest geographic area in the United States, which includes Alaska, Idaho and Montana as well as Washington. A lot of these children (and their parents or families) arrive in Seattle unprepared for the length of stay and the care packages make it just a bit easier for their stay.

She wants everyone to know Children's mission: We believe all children have unique needs and should grow up without illness or injury. With the support of the community and through our spirit of inquiry, we will prevent, treat and eliminate pediatric disease.

She followed the mission statement with the vision to accomplish the mission:

Our founding promise is to care for every child in our region, regardless of their family's ability to pay. We aspire to:

- •Provide the safest, most effective care possible.
- •Control and reduce the cost of providing care.

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•Find cures and educate clinicians and researchers.

Grow responsibly and provide access to every child who needs us.

Hope. Care. Cure. Helen emphasized the fact that Children's performs research on quite a wide platform, Cystic Fibrosis ("CF") being one of those diseases. One of their leading researchers, Dr. Ramsey, has worked to develop a nebulizer that delivers smaller doses of a medical drug *directly* to a child's lungs to combat infection. Current, conventional medicines that are delivered to adults are too much for children's bodies. With the use of this tool, these children are not only living into adulthood, but are also living into having grandchildren.

Dr. Ramsey wasn't satisfied though, as she wanted to determine the actual root cause of CF. She and teams in the U.S. and internationally, have developed a drug that can address patients who have only one of CF's two steps. These teams are realizing success with these children and are now tackling those children who have the "two step" form of CF – a much tougher challenge.

Helen next addressed the issue of research for cancer in children. The treatments such as chemo therapy and radiation that adults can endure have more long-term side effects for children whose bodies are not fully developed, such as hearing loss, losing eyesight, stunted growth and having long term dental problems – all things that parents face must sign off on when making life saving treatment decisions for their children

Another of their researchers, a Dr. Michael Jensen, is taking up this challenge. Cancer cells are irregular cells in your body and, in theory, your immune system should be searching these out and taking care of your body. Dr. Jensen wondered 'why can't we figure out a way to pull out some of these cells from the immune system, those fighter cells, and do a little reprogramming of them, engineer them a little bit, put them back in the kids' bodies, and let their *own* systems fight the cancer, so that they don't have to submit them to radiation and chemotherapy.' What they hope, if this treatments works, is for the child to have two or three weeks of fighting a really bad fluinfection instead of what we see today, which is years, or a lifetime of side effects of treatments. Dr.

Jensen has worked and worked with his teams and currently has a patient who is receiving this care. They are cautious but very optimistic about this therapy. Obviously this is a procedure to be watched.

Helen showed us a video about the care Children's provides as well as their new 330,000 square foot addition, which was just opened on April 21, 2013. The addition added 80 much needed beds and an emergency room. Helen closed with a question and answer period and again thanked the Bluebills for all our support. Janice Hawes and all the Busy Bees were thanked for their contributions as well as the contributions from Don Hilt, Lonnie Stevenson and Maybelle Brickley. What a wonderful job they've all done!


Katie began her career in 1981 as a Registered Nurse in a 40-bed Pediatric unit in northern Kentucky. In 1991 she became a Certified Pediatric Nurse (CPN) and worked as a night Charge Nurse in a Pediatric Intensive Care Unit in Seattle, WA. She has held a Washington State Poison Information Specialist Certification since 1994, and became certified in 1997 as a Specialist in Poison Information (CSPI) by the American Association of Poison Control Centers (AAPCC).

Since 1998, she has provided guidance and support to the Center's multi-disciplinary team of pharmacists, nurses, and poison specialists that respond to over 200 calls daily regarding medication, chemical, environmental, or plant exposures and questions. She works closely with Medical Toxicologists and participates in the center's professional and public education programs.

She has expertise in patient and family teaching and interventions, and frequently acts as a resource person, or mediator. In addition to writing internal guidelines for her poison center, she is a published author in her field, having the distinction of being the only nurse asked to contribute a book chapter to a veterinary toxicology text, as well as numerous abstracts in toxicology journals.
