Jim Beasley introduced our guest speaker Michelle Ryberg, Client Solutions Exec- IRU, AT&T Signature Client Group. Michelle has been in telecommunications about 15 years and has watched the evolution of the mobility industry. She spent most of her

years in sales but her favorite role is her current position at AT&T marketing to the individual users of our signature clients ... such as Boeing retirees. She gets the opportunity to meet thousands of people, host events to educate and help others save money in this tough economy, and support The Boeing Company as the pre-



ferred provider of wireless services. Michelle lives in Newcastle with her husband and three great kids, and in her spare time enjoys cooking, scrapbooking, sports, and travel. Michelle gave us a wonderful presentation albeit a bit frustrating for her since there was no sound to her video ... nonplussed, she forged ahead.

Her job is to drive awareness to employees and retirees of Boeing and its subsidiaries regarding AT&T's *It Can Wait* campaign, as well as service discounts. This initiative focuses on educating people of all ages,

but especially teens, about the dangers of texting and driving.

All employees, retirees, and subsidiary members of The Boeing Company are eligible for a 25% discount off their monthly service with AT&T, as well as 35% off accessories, and up to 50% off on equipment (some exclusions apply). To take advantage of this, just stop into your local AT&T retail store and provide proof of your Boeing membership via your medical ID card or go to the Boeing Discount Program to obtain the Point of Purchase Card located on the Boeing intranet.

Those who send are **23 times** more likely to be in a crash.

The message is simple, yet vital: When it comes to texting and driving, it can wait. You are probably thinking how does this apply to me? More than 100,000 accidents per year are a result of texting and driving causing life changing injuries and death.

The mobile world continues to evolve at an alarming rate, and in 2010 texting rose 50% over the course of the year. AT&T projects that 854 billion text messages crossed its network in 2011.

Texting takes your eyes off the road for an average of five seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field completely blind.

Texting ranks as the #1 mode of communication among teens and those between the ages of 12 and 17 text 60 times a day on average – up from 50 in 2009.

The number of messages exchanged monthly per teen in third quarter 2011 was 3, 417. That's an average of seven (7) messages per waking hour.

#### MEDICARE OPEN ENROLLMENT BE-GAN OCTOBER 15 – START REVIEW-ING YOUR PLAN

With more benefits, better choices and lower costs, the Social Security Administration is encouraging people with Medicare and their families to start reviewing drug and health plan coverage options for 2013. The Medicare Open Enrollment Period starts October 15 and will end until December 7. This will give seniors and people with disabilities more time to compare and find the best plan that meets their unique needs.

Using Medicare's Plan Finder – available at <a href="https://www.medicare.gov/find-a-plan">www.medicare.gov/find-a-plan</a> – can help you find the best plan in your area. You can also see if your current plan is highly rated or may have some problems.

In 2012, there were a number of improvements to Medicare such as; additional benefits to people with Medicare include lower prescription drug costs through a 50 percent discount on covered brand name drugs in the coverage gap (also referred to as the "donut hole"), wellness checkups, and access to certain preventive care with no copayments. # The speaker for the Friday November 30 meeting is Dr. Ed Rubel from the U of W Bloedel Hearing Research Center.

Since so many of us have a hearing problem, I thought his research would be an interesting subject. His subject will be "Can you hear me now."

Edwin W Rubel was born in Chicago, Illinois, and was awarded the Ph.D. in Physiological Psychology from Michigan State University in 1969. After a very brief postdoctoral fellowship at UC Irvine, in Jan. 1971 he joined the faculties in the departments of Psychology and Biology at Yale University as an assistant and then associate professor. In 1978 he moved to the University of Virginia as Professor in the Departments of Otolaryngology and Physiology. Since 1986 he has been a professor in the Departments of Otolaryngology and Physiology and Biophysics, and Adjunct Professor in the Department of Psychology, at the University of Washington in Seattle. He has been Director of Research for the Dept. of Otolaryngology since 1986, and was the founding Director of the Virginia Merrill Bloedel Hearing Research Center at the University of Washington from 1989 to 1993. In 1991 he was named the Virginia Merrill Bloedel Professor of Hearing Science. He has published over 300 scientific papers and book chapters and edited 5 books. His honors include the Jacob Javits Neuroscience Investigator Award and the "Award of Merit" of the Association for Research in Otolaryngology. His research interests include development and plasticity of the central and peripheral auditory system, hair cell regeneration, and modulation of hair cell death. Most recently, he and his colleagues have developed a unique high,

throughput screening system using larvae zebrafish to search for genes and drugs that influence the integrity and resistance to of inner ear hair cells ototoxic injury. They now have 1 drug under development toward clinical use to prevent one form of hearing loss.

They gave about 1700 packages of supplies to food banks; last year Bluebills distributed over 5000. One of the very needy schools, Snoqualmie Valley got 1500 last year and 75 this year. Some schools got 1 or 2. Hopelink did not allow Bluebills to talk to the schools, apparently fearing that we would get to much credit. Bob Lambert will be sending a letter to Hopelink terminating our relationship.

The good news is Boeing is becoming increasingly interested in working with us next year.
