Doug Hoople received calls concerning my August column where I wrote that Llewellyn M. Chilson was the most decorated soldier of World War II. The callers informed him that Audie Murphy was the most decorated soldier.

I got my information from the Washington State Soldiers Home web site. I did more research and found the following from the web site Wikipedia.

"Llewellyn M. Chilson was one of the most decorated U.S. Army Infantry soldiers in World War II. He received 12 individual decorations for combat from the Army, including three Distinguished Service Crosses, Three Silver Stars and 3 Purple Hearts. The President of the United States, Harry Truman, personally decorated Chilson with seven individual decorations for combat, after the war."

Again from Wikipedia, "Audie Murphy was one of the most decorated American Combat Soldiers of World War II, receiving every military combat award for valor available from the U.S. Army, as well as French and Belgian awards for heroism. He received the Medal of Honor, 2 Silver Stars and the Distinguished Service Cross." Another web site states that he had received 33

awards including the above. Both of these brave men are Americans to be proud of.

Speaker for October

JAMES D. RAISBECK, Founder & Chairman of the Board, Raisbeck Engineering, Inc.

After serving in the Air Force as a flight engineer from 1954 to 1958, and graduating from Purdue University in Aeronautical and Aerospace Engineering in 1961, James Raisbeck joined The Boeing Airplane Company as a Research Aerodynamicist.

In 1969, Raisbeck accepted the position of President and Chief Engineer of Robertson Aircraft Corporation; then decided to fly solo in 1973 when he founded Raisbeck Engineering, Inc., which—along with its subsidiary Raisbeck Commercial Air Group—continues to present day.

During his distinguished aviation career, Raisbeck has influenced many business turbine and jet aircraft designs, from the Rockwell Sabreliner 65-Series and Learjet 31s, 35s, 36s and 60s, and produced a line of performance improvement systems for the entire Beechcraft King Air Family, now incorporated on the King Air production line.

Raisbeck Engineering has also been active in the world’s commercial airline fleets, with the Raisbeck Stage 3 Noise Reduction Systems for the Boeing 727, Armored Cockpit Security Systems for Boeing 737s and 757s—a program initiated two years before 9/11—and Enlarged Overhead Bins for the Airbus 320.

Raisbeck’s numerous professional acknowledgements and awards include the National Business Aviation Association’s Lifetime Meritorious Achievement Award, the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Aviation Pathfinder Award, Living Legends of Aviation’s Lifetime Aviation Entrepreneur Award, and American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Fellow.

From the **north** take 405 S Bronson Way. Keep right and continue on S 2nd St. to Williams Ave S. Turn left onto Williams Ave S and turn right onto 5th St. Go one block and turn right onto Burnett Ave S to VFW. From the **south** go north on Highway 405 to Exit 2 Hwy 167 Rainier Ave S. Go north to S Grady Way. Turn right on S Grady Way to Talbot Rd (3rd light) turn left on Talbot Rd. One block left on Talbot Rd. Then turn right on 7th St and then left on Burnett Ave S. Continue three blocks to VFW.
