What, Why and Who

First, Bluebills are still the Bluebills !!!

What: As many of you are noticing the Boeing Bluebills are now the PSO (Peninsula Support Organization) Bluebills. As in most organizations or relationships, change is a part of growing. The Boeing organization helped start the Bluebills and supported it for many, many years. However, over the last three years Boeing has been unable to support us and has closed down the Bluebills offices near the old Boeing Headquarters. That said, a big THANK YOU Boeing is in order. Without them the Bluebills wouldn't have become what we are today.

Why: Under Boeing we, the Bluebills, were restricted to Boeing funding only and retired Boeing employees only as volunteers.

With the foresight and wisdom of Barbara Berthiaume, Jay Gilmor and Myron Vogt, the PSO a non-profit organization for both tax purposes and the ability to raise funds, was started. Under the PSO, the Bluebills can recruit anyone as a volunteer, and we can raise funding from any source. This change allows us the ability to do even more for our communities!

Who: The PSO was originally chaired by Myron (thanks Myron). STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education support was the first program under the PSO umbrella, led by Bob Reasoner (thanks Bob). Bob in turn asked me (Dave Jackson) to lead the STEM program, which I am honored to do. When Myron moved most recently, he ask if I could also chair the PSO. I said I would do my best. As these changes were occurring, Barbara and others made a case for the Bluebills to also be under the PSO umbrella, with the vision for the Bluebills to remain the Bluebills. Now, all of the Bluebills programs are under the PSO umbrella: Food Banks, Fall Prevention, Aging in Place, Advocacy Support, School Supply Distribution, the Christmas Giving Program and STEM.



Creativity in a Pinch

The client is an amputee and was unable to get up or down the cinderblock stairs. Without a railing or reasonable riser spacing, even his wife had difficulty with the stairs. The project was complicated by the need to occasionally move the trailer. It was further complicated by outrageous and changing lumber prices. Our solution was to build a ramp with a railing on one side only. The other had a straight side with no exposed posts or obstructions. Hopefully, this will allow them good access to the trailer and the ability to back the trailer in close to the ramp side. The American Legion, Marvin G. Shields Memorial Post #26, and the Port Townsend Elks Lodge helped make this ramp possible. Builders were Dave Parish, Denny Schuch, Dan Nieuwsma, John Fillers, and Richard Meyers. The builders (and diggers) are getting fast and efficient. We finished and cleaned up in just under 4 hours.





Bluebills responded to help a lady in need without funds. We installed grab bars in her shower with no charge for materials. We also found materials in our warehouse to build her a rail down her front steps. She was extremely appreciative for Bluebills' response to her needs. It took some persistence to make this happen, as she was not able to respond to phone calls attempting to schedule our help. - David Parrish



JeffCo Builders Behind The Scenes - Bluebills At Home

Joe Gagnier and Todd Knoblock obtained materials and fabricated ramp ends then delivered them to our warehouse. Dave Parrish moved the first batch to his makeshift paint shop under his home and started finishing work. Each ramp end gets an oil based prime coat, oil-based finish coat, then top surface receives second finish coat with crushed walnut shells for a non-skid surface. With drying time involved, the process takes about six days. As the picture shows, we do about seven ramp ends at a time.

Bluebills charge only \$25 for a ramp end — another great bargain for our clients.

Back to Work

Following a year or so of being held back by Covid, and now after being fully vaccinated, Bluebills are back on the job. As retirees, we don't work for paychecks these days, except the kind of payoff that rewards us with a warm glow of satisfaction. We are at work on projects that are making our communities better places to live.

The goal of our Independent Living Program is to keep elderly and handicapped people in their own homes as long as possible. We do this by making the home as safe and accessible as we can. Common projects include ramp construction, grab bar installation, handrail installation, transfer pole installation, chair/sofa risers, and minor repairs relating to safety and ease of living.

The average age of our volunteers is somewhere around 70. After an 8 hour day of hard labor – with a 5 minute break for lunch – building wheelchair ramps, installing railings, grab bars, performing other fall prevention tasks, and trying to get caught up with the backlog, we return home sore from our bad backs, bad knees, and general out-of-shapedndess. So what's up with that? Maybe it's because if we don't do it, who else will? Then again, to quote Alfred P. Doolittle:

The Lord above gave man an arm of iron
So he could do his job and never shirk
The Lord above gave man an arm of iron
But, with a little bit of luck, with a little bit of luck
Someone else will do the blinkin' work











Bluebill Builders

One important facet of the PSO Bluebills activities is the Independent Living Program, serving the Kitsap, Jefferson and Clallam counties. Modeled after a program developed by the AARP, the Bluebills help identify and correct housing problems that interfere with or prevent the occupant from safely performing the day-to-day functions necessary to live at home, focusing on safety.

To put it plainly, the Bluebills Builders install grab bars, railings and ramps for guarding against falls which can lead to serious injury and immobility. No one is excluded from the program because of income. Labor is free from our volunteers, but recipients may be asked to contribute toward the cost of materials. Since the beginning of the year, the Builders have answered more than 30 requests for grab bars and ramps in the local area between Port Townsend and Port Ludlow. Several projects are pending and new requests come in every week.

Several Bluebills make up a core of experienced Builders. Each can survey the ramp area, design the ramp according to regulations and manage its construction. All ramps are built with the approval of the recipient who may be present the day of the build. Grab bars are installed in strategic places, where hand holds make for safer transition from sitting to standing, or for stability. After each project is completed, it is rewarding to know that the result means a safer home for the recipient. The Builders are busy and now with the drier, sunny weather, building activity has increased.
